

Making a Bibliography

bibliography an alphabetically ordered list of all the resources that you used to write your research paper

Remember these points for your bibliography:

1. Each source is single-spaced (not double-spaced).
2. Leave one single space between each source.
3. Indent the second line of each source (this is called a “hanging indent”)
4. List your sources in *alphabetical order*.
5. Use the correct APA format for each source.
6. Pay attention to the *correct use of punctuation*. Leave once space after a period, comma, semi-colon and colon.
7. Pay attention to the correct use of capital letters and italics.
